

Culture Celebration

First Nations Incursions' Culture Celebration program aligns with the Australian Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF V2.0) and the Victorian Early Years Learning and Development Framework (VEYLDF). This alignment is based on the program's rich cultural content and its alignment with both national and state-level early learning goals.

Program Highlights - Culture Celebration

- Begins with a Welcome to Country by a senior clan elder, setting a respectful tone of cultural connection.
- Followed by interactive storytelling accompanied by the mystical sound of the didgeridoo.
- Transitions into a tribal didgeridoo and beats dance frenzy, inviting children to participate through rhythm and dance.
- Delivered by two performers—an Aboriginal elder and world-renowned didgeridoo virtuoso (Ganga Giri) with amplification to engage the entire centre.
- Designed for whole-centre participation

Alignment with EYLF V2.0

1. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Perspectives (Principle)

This program foregrounds Indigenous voices and cultural authenticity through ceremonial welcome, storytelling, and performance, embodying EYLF's call for respectful cultural inclusion.

2. Learning Outcomes

The dynamic, multisensory nature of the dance and music experience fosters curiosity, engagement, and active participation.

Music, dance, and storytelling offer rich non-verbal and verbal avenues for children to express, interpret, and respond.

3. Principles & Practices

- Cultural responsiveness: Centering a senior elder and First Nations artist fosters cultural safety, authenticity, and respect.
- Play-based and intentional learning: Rhythmic dance, communal storytelling, and music-based routines support intentional engagement through joyful, embodied learning experiences.

Alignment with VEYLDF

- **Identity & Community:** Strongly supports children's sense of belonging by linking them directly to First Nations culture and Country.
- **Communication:** Enhances expressive modes through shared movement/dance, and cultural storytelling.
- **Wellbeing & Engagement:** Encourages emotional resonance, connection, and joyous participation through inclusive, celebratory experiences.

By blending tradition, music, and movement, this program offers **a holistic, culturally grounding experience for young learners.**
